The following excerpts were taken from the paper "The Doings" published by Theodore Grinder in the early 1900s.

1908

4/1908 -Sanders Bros. had their Clover Huller out last Thurs. to pick the valuable seed out of a two year old hay stack. They succeeded in getting about 2 Bu. and well worth while.

4/1908 -The caucus at the town hall was a quiet affair. The following is the ticket: Supervisors -B.T. Daley, H.V. Jenson, L.A. Gobel; Clerk -O.J. Dahlby; Assessor- E.L. Flisram -Treasurer -H.K. Gladen; Justice of the Peace -John Haag, Tom Argue; To Fill Vacancy -E.F. Goli, L.M. Kittleston; Constables -L.T. Borstad, I.B.Daley, Eugene Post; Ballot Clerks -John Holtz, L.M.Kittleston.

4/1908- Gladen and Hanson sold an 8 months old colt for the handsome sum of \$85.00. The colt is from the famous Boydston now owned by L.M.Kittleston.

4/1908 -A bouncing big boy at O.K. Stenseth's Monday morning. Congratulations!

5/1908 -Lewis Thompson puts in his spare time building a fence around the school.

5/1908 -John Stuckey has a "Honker". Last Wed. an automobile company came out with a two-seated Cadillac, left it here with Mr.S. and went home rejoicing. The wet weather has kept John scratching his head and the auto in the shed.

5/1908 -Born to Mr. and Mrs. Ben Peterson on Fri. the 15th, a boy. Mother and child are doing well.

5/1908 -A.M. Grinder has brought eggs at the rate of 8 dozen a day so far this spring. Score one for the Leghorns!

6/1908 -John Peterson is hauling rock for the foundation of a new house which Ole Stensby will erect this summer for his own use.

6/1908 -Mrs. Amanda Goli will teach parochial school in Daleyville this summer.

6/1908 -Mr. and Mrs. Knudt Kleppe are proud of the safe arrival of a baby girl June 1st. Congratulations!

6/1908 -Edwin and George Ruste, Olin Paulson, Curtis Chesterson, William Grimstad, Elmer Hill, Grant Rundhaug, Albert Bruflat, and Selma Goli are home from Northfield, Minn. where they have been attending St. Olaf College. Selma Goli brought with her a diploma of graduation from the Scientific Course and Ed. Ruste and Albert Bruflat brought each one from the English Course, both of the Academic Dept.

6/1908 -Arne Anderson will have some brown leghorn cockrels of the famous Castleton-strain for sale this fall. Anyone wishing some, had better get their order in early.

7/1908 -Mr. and Mrs. Ed Grinder went to Mt. Horeb Monday for a load of furniture. They brought it home by the hay rack full. Yesterday they moved into their neat and commodious new house.

7/1908 -The Perry Pigeonfencing will have a basket picnic at Andrew Thompson's bluff, Aug. 2nd. The girls will bring their baskets filled with good wholesome food and lunch will be served at 12 o'clock.

7/1908 -The Clay Hill Mission Society meets with Mrs. Halvor Helgeson today.

7/1908 -Isaac Stephenson asked the people of Wisconsin for the short term in the U.S. Senate, caused by the resignation of Spooner. He got it! What more do we owe him?

9/1908 -Gena Thompson is home from her trip through the European countries.

9/1908 -Alma Ankaltrud arrived home to stay for a few days before she leaves for Madison, Minn. where she will attend school.

9/1908 -Born to Mr. and Mrs. Gerhard Syftestad, a bouncing baby boy. We congratulate them on their first born.

9/1908 -Knut Rundhaug is helping Stensby with carpentering.

9/1908 -Belle Sanders finished a term of parochial school in the Moen district.

10/1908 -The sidewalk is now finished as far as the schoolhouse except a short stretch in front of the C.E. Paulson lot. We hope this gap will be filled in before the snow flies. When this is done we can boast of a quarter mile of cement walks.

10/1908 -Last Saturday morning, M.J. Johnson loaded up four newcomers and took them to Madison where they swore off their allegiance to all foreign sovereigns, and especially to King Haakon VII and received their intention papers. They were Hartvig Rangmoe, Jens Haakonsen, Johnnie Martenson, and Sigurd Nilson. There were others from the township that were in the same day, but we did not learn their names.

10/1908 -The National news of the election is coming in rather slowly, but we have at 1 P.M. the following: Wisconsin, Minnesota, Iowa, Illinois, Ohio and the rest of northern states give Taft handsome majorities. New York is claimed good and safe by the Republicans. Indiana is close, possibly going Democratic. Wisconsin gave Taft 100,000 and Davidson 75,000 pluralities. The county seems to be pretty much Republican. Ruste is possibly beat. The Democratic candidate for sheriff is well in the lead. Iowa County is Republican through and through. Minnesota elected a Democratic governor but gave Taft a big majority.

12/1908 -Knudt Retrum is busy collecting the "Prestelon" these days.

12/1908 -Upon the resignation of Edw. Goli, Paul Syftestad has accepted and will act as deacon for 1 year.

1909

1/1909 -The Woodman Lodge gave an oyster supper last Sat.evening for their friends.

1/1909 -John E. Stensby's phone has been transferred from the main line to the Clay Hill cluster. His ring on that line is a short and two-long.

2/1909 -Rev.H. Hoverstad returned last Sat. from DeForest where he attended a pastoral conference. The distance from Mt..Horeb was made on skis, which was the only way to travel.

2/1909 -Thore Grundahl is taking advantage of the fine sleighing weather by drawing lumber for a new house which he will build next summer.

2/1909 -Ludvig Valstad had a wood hauling bee last Thur. Many of his neighbors turned out and brought some 20 loads of cord wood to Daleyville.

3/1909 -Mrs.T. Homme will entertain the Homme Ladies Aid on Thurs.

3/1909 -Mr. and Mrs. P.V. Peterson are now settled in their home near Forward. They have not moved their stock and have ample time to arrange things before the busy season starts.

5/1909 -The whip-poor-will was heard for the first time this season.

6/1909 -The people seem very contented these days. The strawberries are ripe and they are in abundance.

7/1909 -O.J. Dahlby is enjoying his 15 day vacation. His brother N.J. serves the patrons on Route 5, and serves them well.

7/1909 -The switchboard at the central here has caused more or less trouble the past few weeks and is now out of commission. It is now more than 2 months since new plugs were ordered, but that seems to be the end of it.

10/1909 -Brother Steensland of Hollandale was in town last Friday. We acknowledge a pleasant call. Mr. S.. was out drumming up business for his paper "The Weekly Review".

11/1909 -Wedding bells are ringing today for Maren Olava Mitmoen and Henry Knudtson. Tomorrow they ring for Clara Berg and Arthur Moen.

11/1909 -Rev. Hoverstad will preach his last sermon in York next Sunday.

12/1909 -Bernhard Brusveen and family have moved to Hollandale.

12/1909 -A marriage license was issued last week to Carl Milestone and Lena Anderson.
